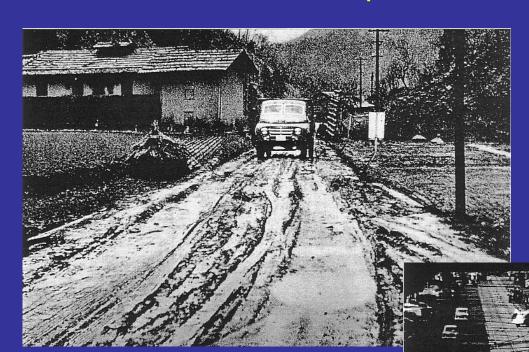

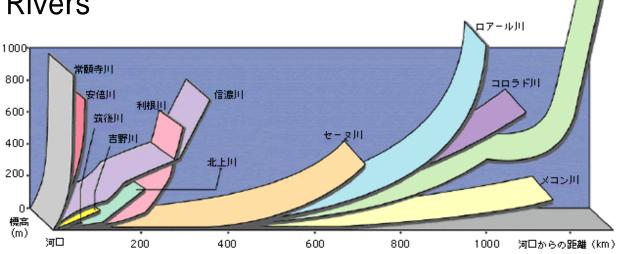

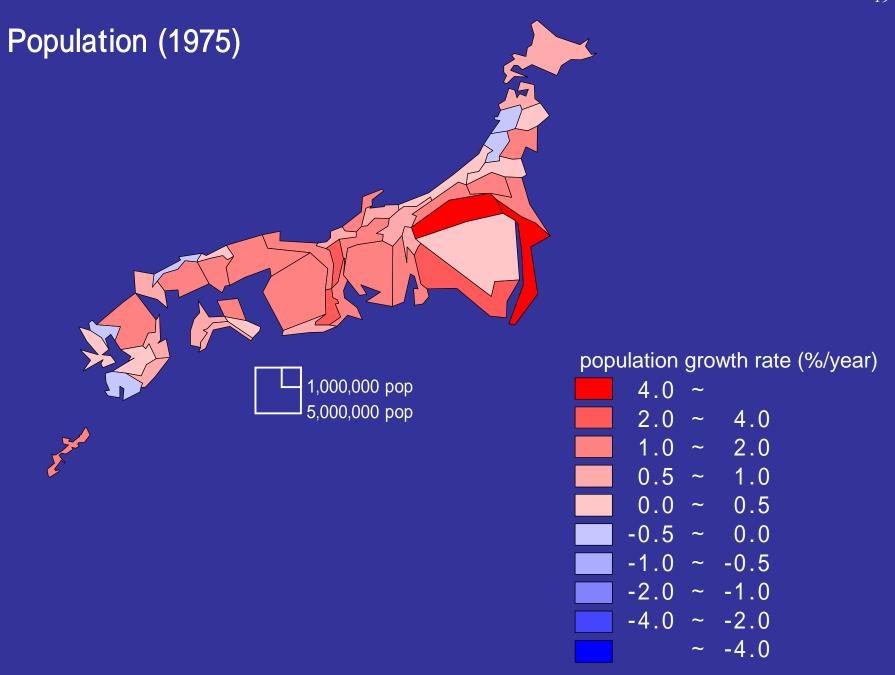


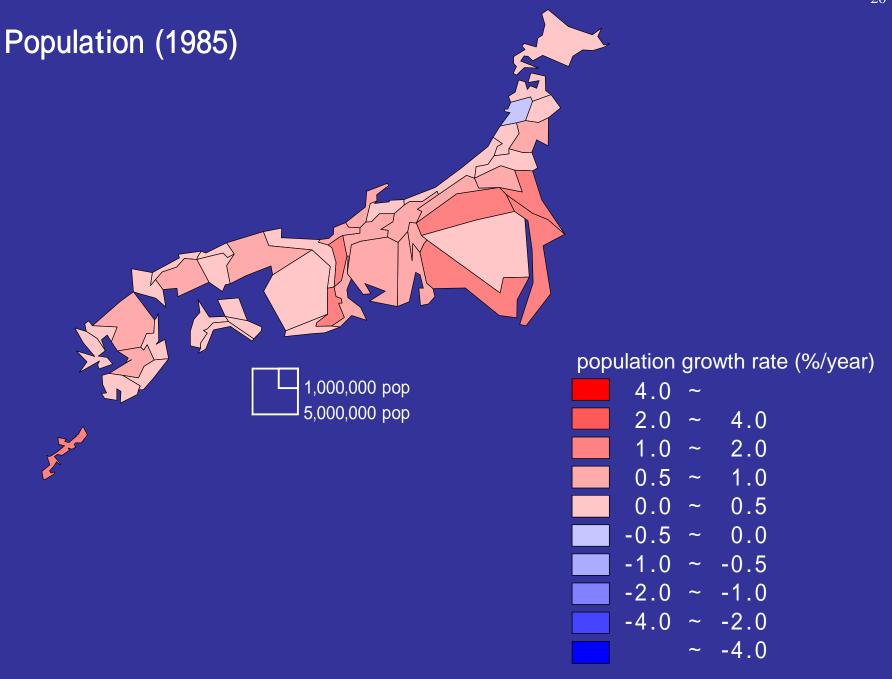
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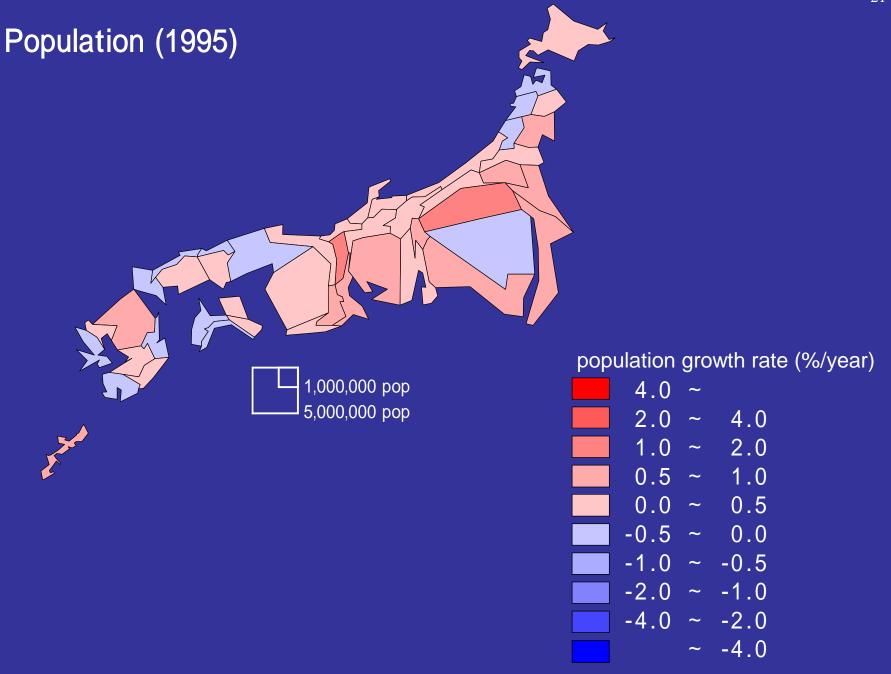


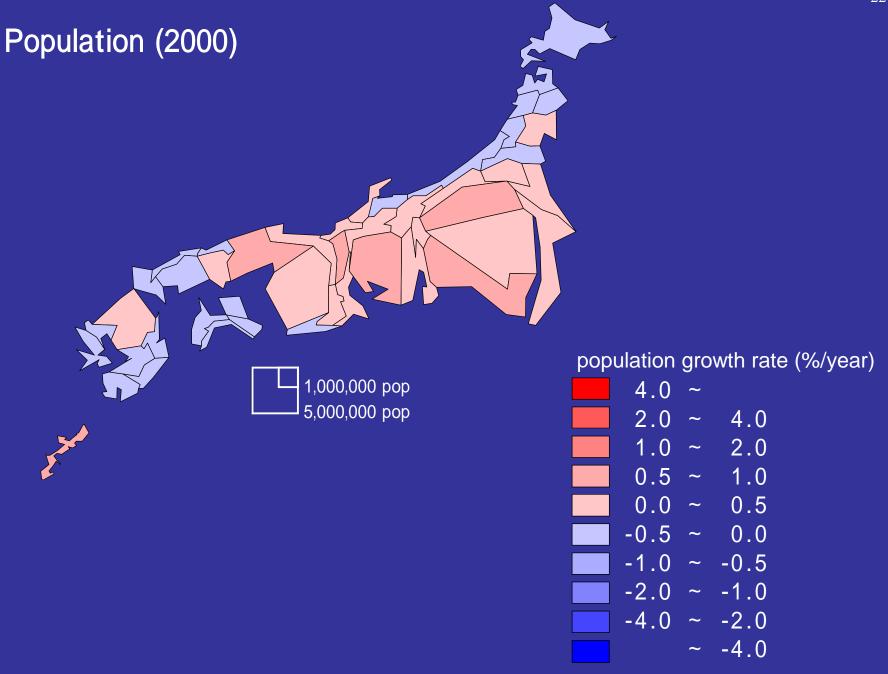
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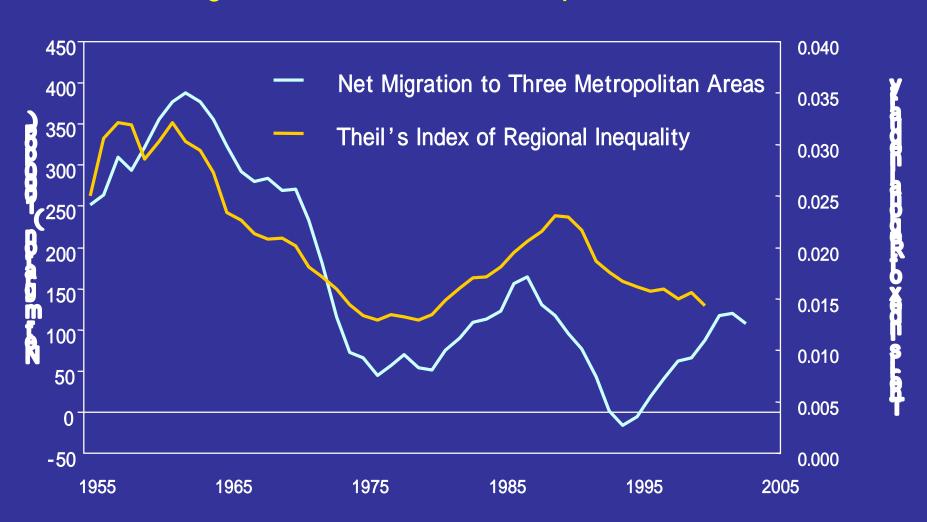




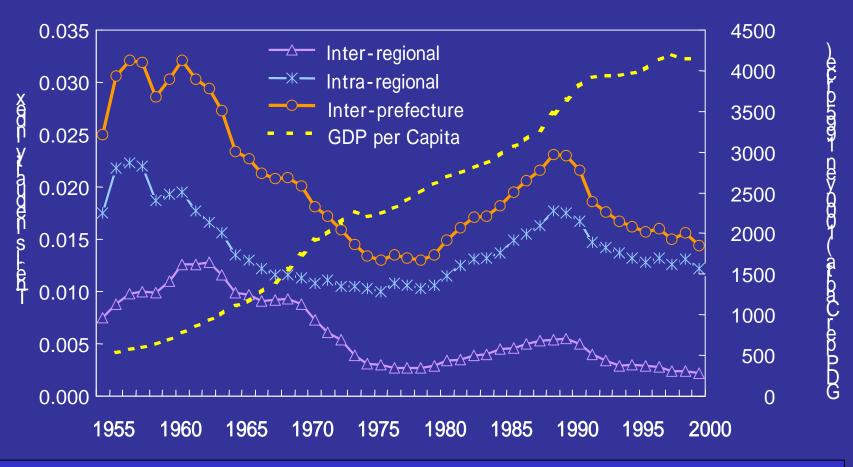




Regional Income Disparity and Net Migration to Three Metropolitan Areas



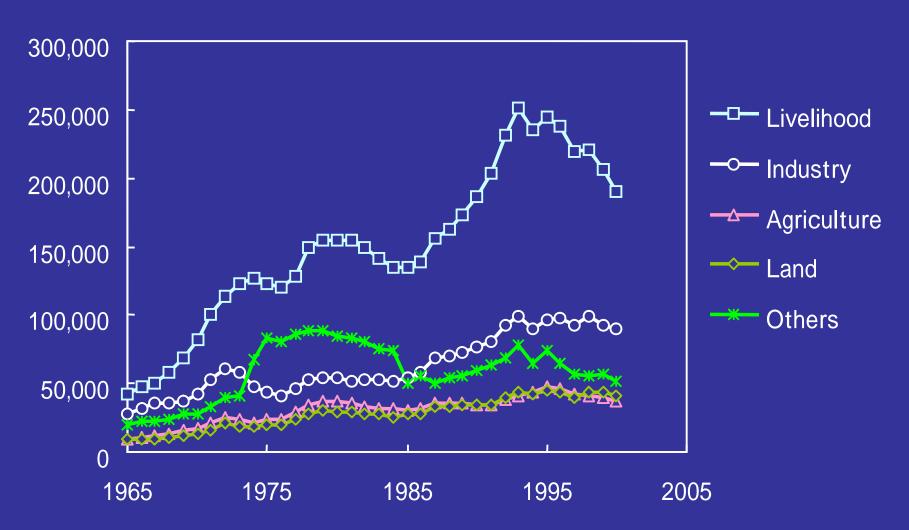
Regional Income Disparity and GDP per Capita

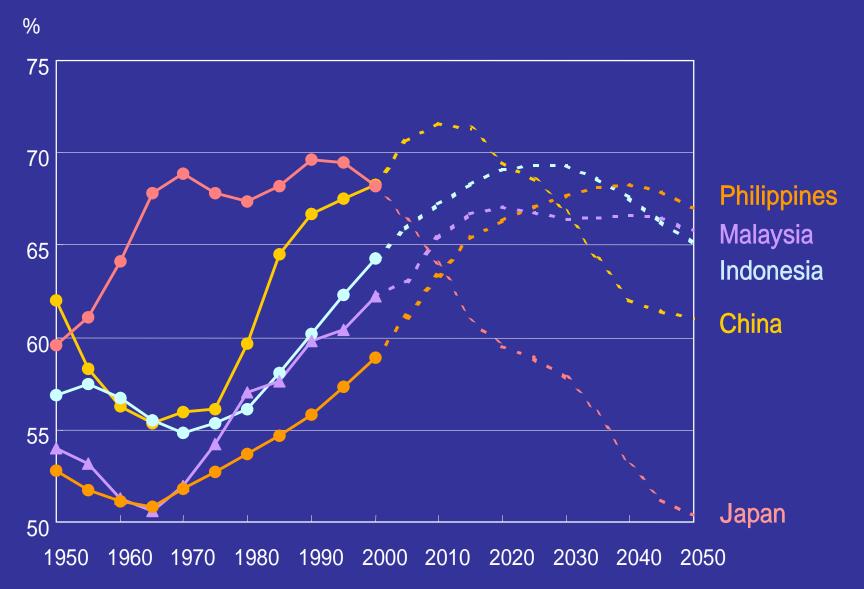

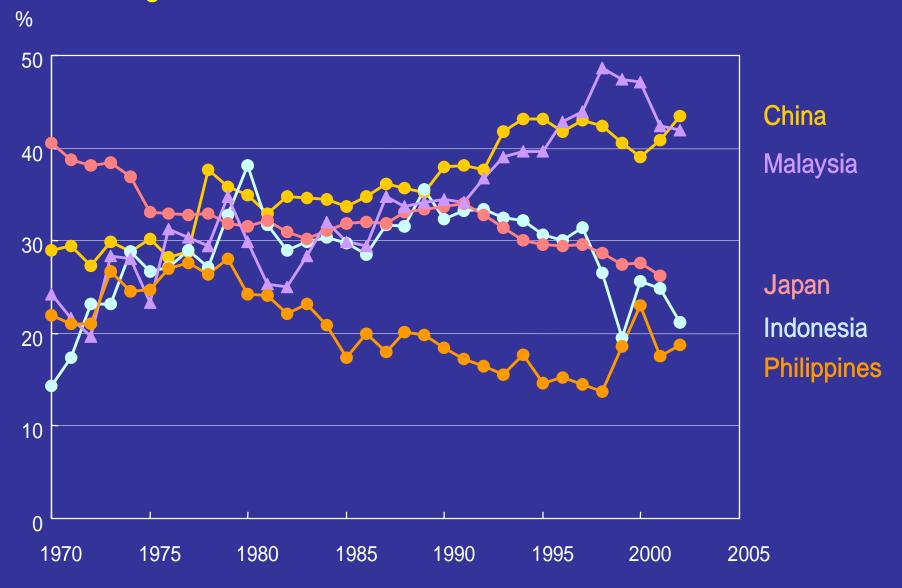

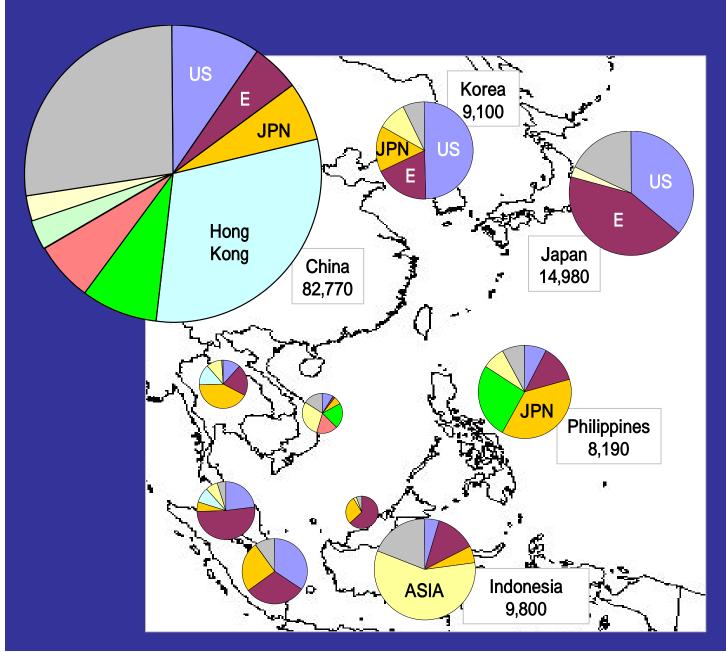

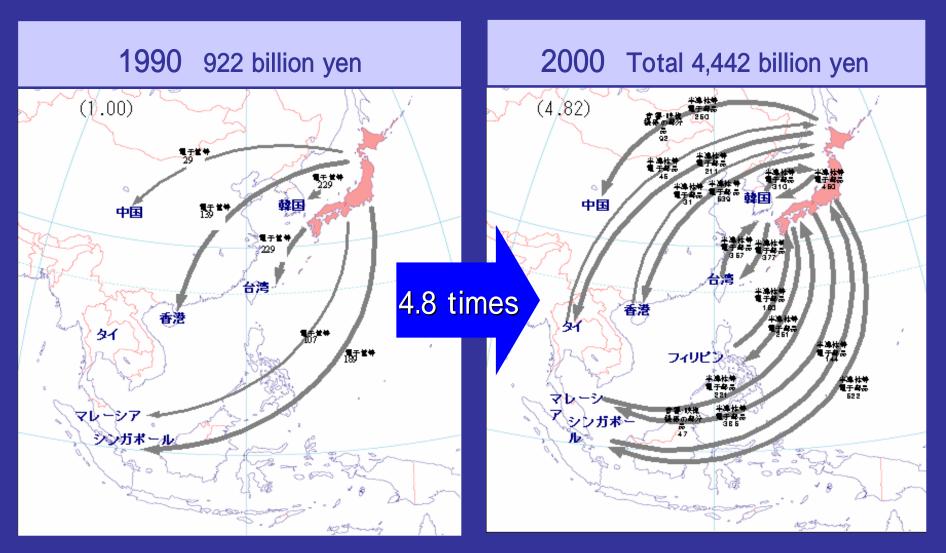

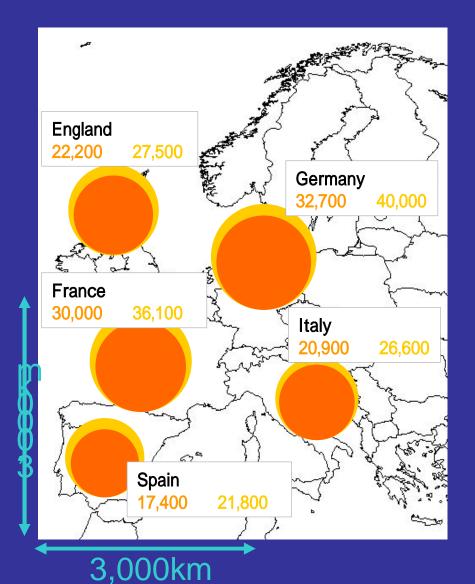

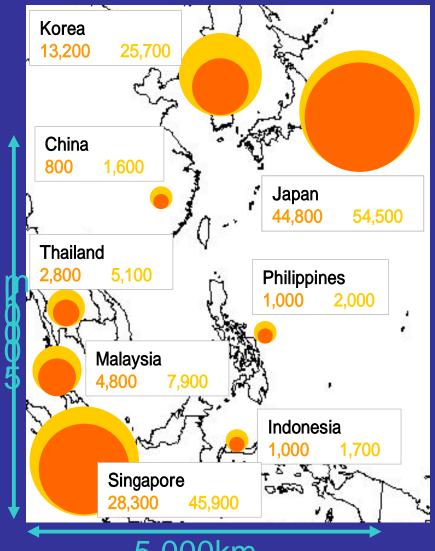

GDP per Capita of EU Countries GDP per Capita of Eastern Asia Countries (2000, 2010 1995 US \$)



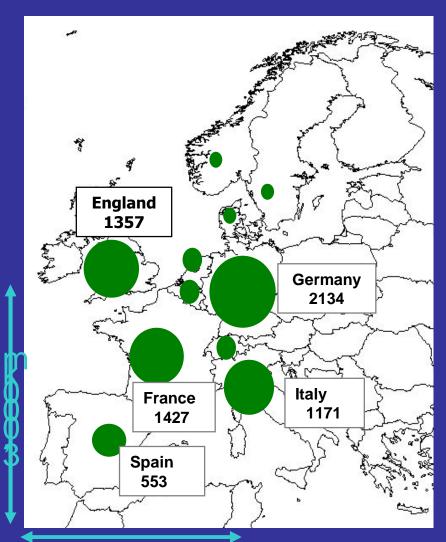

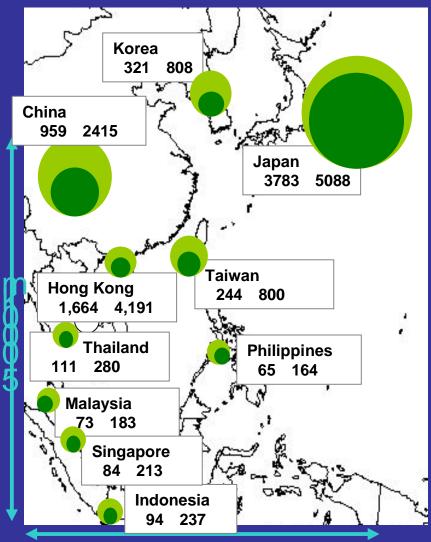
GDP of EU Countries

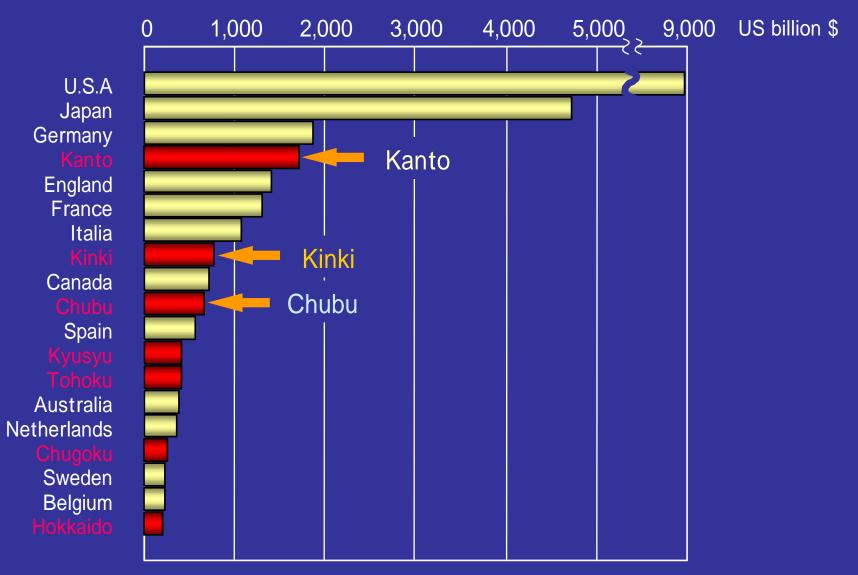

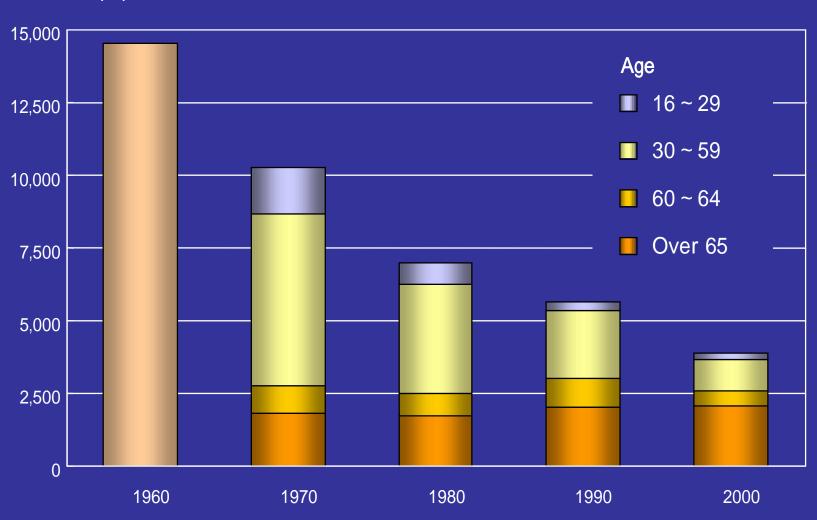

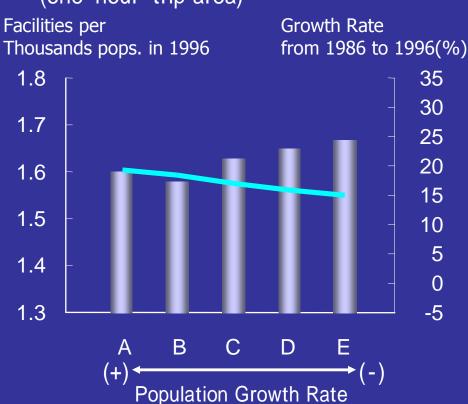

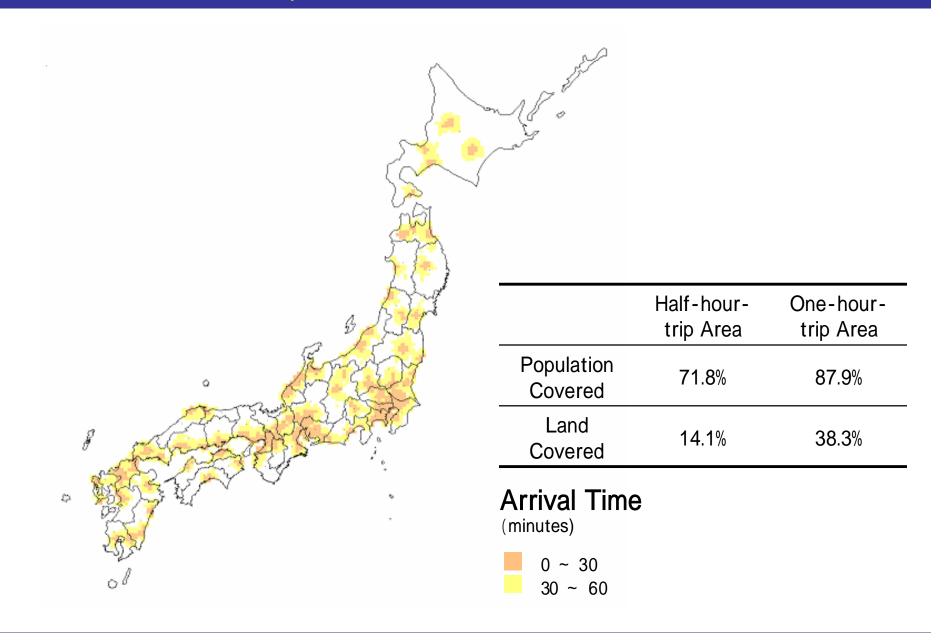

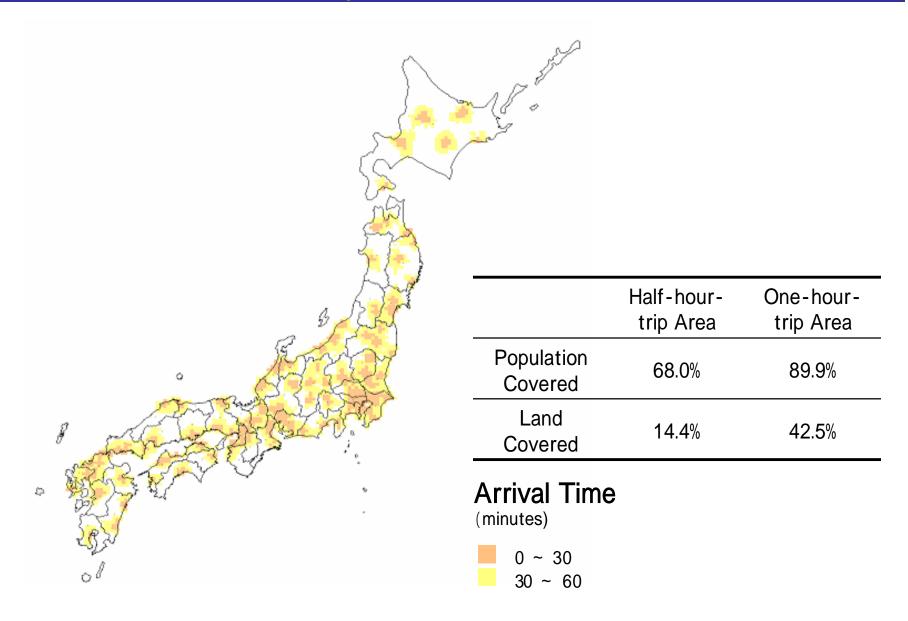

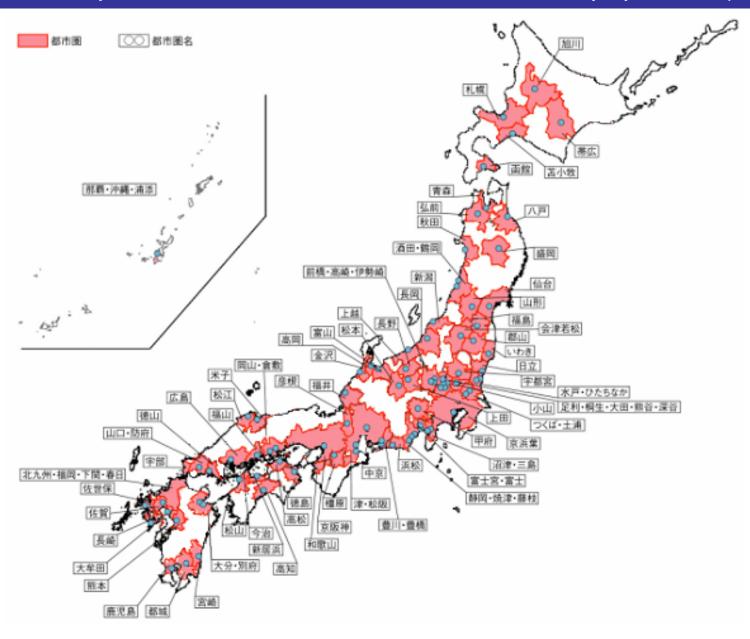
Accessibility Coverage Shopping Center over 30 Thousand Square Meter Gross Floor Area within an Hour

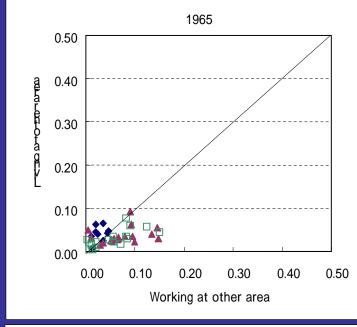

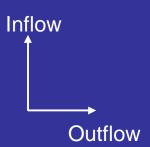

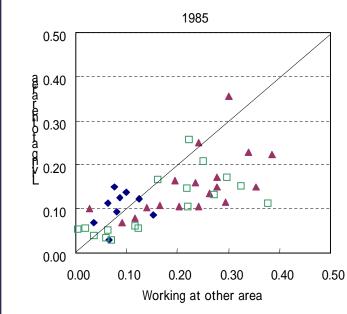

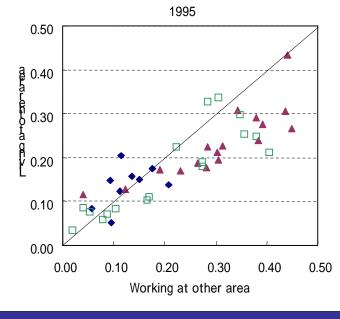
Expansion of Livelihood Area: Inflow and Outflow of Labors (1965-1995)

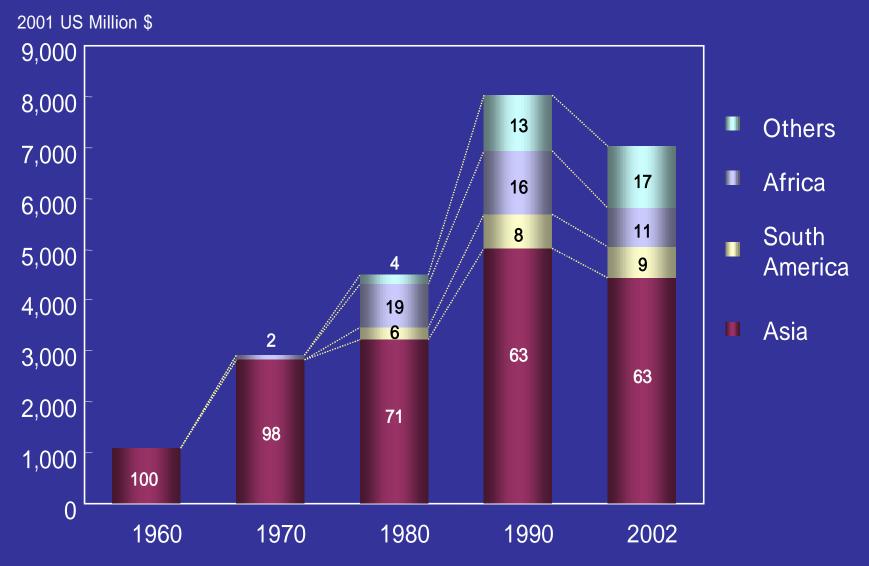
